



Mold Toxicity a Silent Killer: Center for Occupational & Environmental Medicine Warns About the Dangers of Mold

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The Center for Occupational & Environmental Medicine (COEM), based in North Charleston, SC, warns of the dangers of people getting exposed to mold. They want to stress that mold toxicity is a silent killer and many people are not even aware of it. Tens of millions of Americans are suffering from allergies, asthma or breathing disorders without realizing that these may be due to their exposure to mold.

In the effort to make more people aware of this danger, they have recently posted a video of Dr. Weirs discussing mold toxicity. There are about a half dozen types of mold that are very dangerous, like black mold (*Stachybotrys*). If the effects of this mold are not treated properly, it can lead to immune system problems, lung disease, neurological disorders like Parkinson's or Alzheimer's, and even gastrointestinal problems. Fortunately, COEM has been successfully treating patients for mold toxicity from various parts of the world since 1978. Their physicians have seen various cases of mold exposure and its toxic effects and they are experienced in providing accurate diagnosis and treatment of mold injuries.

Exposure to toxic mold can cause a number of symptoms, these include: brain fog & memory problems; muscle and joint aches and pains (including cramping); coughing & wheezing; nosebleeds; sinus pain; headaches; fatigue; dizziness; sleep disorders; night sweats; sensitivity to light; difficulties losing weight; skin rashes; diarrhea; nausea; abdominal pain; immune suppression; kidney and lung disease; anxiety & depression; difficulty focusing or finishing a task; disorganization; feeling disconnected, confused, or losing parts of one's personality; nerve pain; and numbness & tingling.

During mold treatment and diagnosis, they look for biomarkers of exposure to mold through blood, urine, and advanced allergy testing to determine the patient's sensitivity and the type of mold they have been exposed to. Some of the indicators of mold poisoning are the existence of metabolites of the mold and mycotoxins which appear in the body of a person who has had an exposure. Further, they can appear with poor lung function, low white blood cell count, and neurological damage related to exposure to biotoxins. By knowing the type of mold and its effects, the physician will be able to determine the appropriate mold toxicity treatment to provide.

The initial appointment for a new patient includes a lengthy consultation that reviews the patient's life and health history. They will then assess several factors from that history including allergies, infections, stress, toxicity, lifestyle, nutrition, and genetics. At the completion of this appointment, the doctor will discuss the recommended treatment.
