Timelines can vary materially by program, donor documentation, and clinical requirements. The guide explains the role of legally binding agreements, pre-birth orders where appropriate, medical screening, and psychological support in reducing ambiguity for participants. It also notes that the exact legal and medical process can vary by situation, which is why families should work with independent legal counsel and qualified fertility professionals before proceeding.
