



VNDentalTravel Formalises Two-Stage Assessment Process for Overseas Dental Patients

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VNDentalTravel has formalised a two-stage assessment process intended to give international dental patients a clearer understanding of what can and cannot be confirmed before they travel to Vietnam.

The process separates preliminary remote planning from the final clinical plan established after an in-person examination and diagnostic imaging. It is particularly relevant to patients from Australia and New Zealand considering dental implants, multiple extractions or full-arch rehabilitation.

Before travelling, patients may provide recent dental X-rays, photographs, previous treatment records and information about their dental concerns. These materials can help a coordinating team identify possible treatment pathways, estimate the number of appointments required and highlight questions that need to be resolved at the clinic.

However, patient-provided records do not always show current bone volume, active gum conditions, the restorability of individual teeth or the relationship between the upper and lower bite. For this reason, VNDentalTravel's process identifies remote proposals as preliminary rather than presenting them as a

confirmed diagnosis.

“A remote review is useful because it gives the patient a working framework, but it should not be treated as a substitute for a clinical examination,” a VNDentalTravel spokesperson said. “The purpose of the first stage is to establish what is reasonably known, what is still uncertain and which decisions must wait until the dentist has examined the patient.”

The second stage takes place after arrival in Vietnam. It may include an oral examination, three-dimensional dental imaging and an assessment of the gums, remaining teeth, jawbone anatomy and bite. The treating dentist can then confirm whether the proposed restoration remains appropriate and whether preparatory treatment is required.

For implant patients, the in-person findings may determine the number and position of implants, whether a tooth can be retained, and whether procedures such as an extraction, bone graft or sinus lift need to be incorporated. Patients researching dental implants in Vietnam are therefore advised to distinguish between a preliminary estimate based on submitted information and the treatment plan approved by the treating clinician.

The framework also addresses how changes should be communicated. If the confirmed plan differs from the remote proposal, the patient should receive an explanation of the new clinical finding, the treatment alternatives available and the effect on timing or recovery. A change made after new diagnostic information becomes available is different from an unexplained addition to the original plan.

This distinction has practical consequences for international patients. Flights, accommodation and annual leave may be organised weeks before treatment begins. A patient expecting a single-stage procedure could face difficulties if an unrecognised infection, insufficient bone volume or an unrestorable tooth changes the sequence of care after arrival.

Under the two-stage approach, preliminary documents are expected to state which procedures are anticipated, which items remain subject to examination and what conditions could alter the schedule. Patients can then plan appropriate flexibility without assuming that every detail has already been clinically confirmed.

The process also encourages patients to ask whether their proposed treatment will require one visit or multiple visits. The implant information published by VNDentalTravel explains that many conventional cases involve an initial stay for implant placement, a healing period and a later visit for the final restoration. Immediate treatment may be possible in selected cases, but suitability depends on clinical findings.

VNDentalTravel said the objective of formalising the distinction is to reduce misunderstandings at the point

where remote information becomes an in-person diagnosis. It also provides a clearer record of how the final treatment decision was reached.

The company noted that the framework does not guarantee eligibility for a particular procedure. Final recommendations remain the responsibility of the treating dentist following an examination in Vietnam.
