



HRC Climate Services Heating and Cooling Shares Fall Furnace and Heat Pump Preparation Guidance for Utah County Homeowners

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As overnight temperatures begin to drop across Utah County and the Wasatch Front, HRC Climate Services Heating and Cooling is offering seasonal guidance to help homeowners prepare their heating systems before colder weather settles in. The family-owned company, based in Spanish Fork, notes that early autumn is the period when small comfort problems are easiest to identify and correct.

According to the company, many heating breakdowns occur during the first significant cold snap, when furnaces and heat pumps are asked to run at full capacity after months of inactivity. Addressing minor concerns now, rather than during peak heating season, can reduce the likelihood of an emergency call on the coldest night of the year.

The company recommends that homeowners begin with the simplest steps. Replacing a clogged air filter improves airflow and eases strain on the system, while checking thermostat settings ensures the equipment

cycles as intended. Homeowners are encouraged to run their furnace or heat pump for a short test cycle before the season arrives, listening for unusual noises such as banging, grinding, or repeated clicking during ignition, all of which can signal developing issues.

Uneven heating between rooms is another common complaint that often points to airflow restrictions, ductwork leaks, or an aging system struggling to distribute warm air. The company adds that ignition concerns on gas furnaces, including delayed starts or a burner that fails to stay lit, should be examined promptly because they can affect both comfort and safety.

Indoor air quality also becomes a greater concern as homes are sealed against the cold. HRC Climate Services notes that dry winter air, dust circulation, and reduced ventilation can affect comfort and health, and that humidification and filtration measures are worth reviewing before windows stay closed for the season.

"The homeowners who reach out in September and October tend to have a much smoother winter than those who wait," said Alisha Casey of HRC Climate Services Heating and Cooling. "A strange noise or a room that never quite warms up is the system telling you something. Those signals are easy to overlook in the fall, but they rarely fix themselves once the temperature drops."
