However, less than half of the public are aware of the clear link between alcohol use and cancer ? a situation that many public health and consumer agencies hope to rectify through improved warning labels on alcohol.

The U.S. Department of Treasury's Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and Trade Bureau was urged in a letter in June 2019 to adopt a new, more informative, warning label on alcohol products that reads, ?Government Warning: According to the Surgeon General, consumption of alcoholic beverages can cause cancer, including breast and colon cancers.?

The concern, according to the director of food policy at the Consumer Federation of America (CFA), is that the alcohol industry has managed to convince the public at large that moderate alcohol consumption can

improve your health, thus creating a misleading ?health halo? surrounding alcohol. As with tobacco products, the government must warn the public about the risks involved with alcohol consumption based on the latest scientific evidence available.

The Surgeon General?s 2016 report showed that a single drink a day can increase the risk of breast and other forms of cancer. According to a 2017 cancer study, alcohol consumption is the third highest cause of cancer in women behind obesity and tobacco. It is the fourth highest cause of cancer in men behind obesity, tobacco, and UV radiation.

A 2016 study demonstrated that cancer warning signs on alcohol can produce favorable changes in drinking habits, even among high-risk drinkers. With only less than half of the public aware that alcohol consumption, even in small quantities, can increase your risk of colon, liver, larynx, breast, oral cavity, esophagus, rectum, and pharynx cancer, an accurate cancer risk warning would help to save lives.

While there is a wellness trend that helped to reduce global alcohol consumption by 1.6 percent from 2018 to 2019, alcohol is still one of the most harmful substances people consume. The government is responsible for providing adequate warnings to the public so that they can weigh the risk of drinking alcohol for themselves, especially since alcohol is also physically addictive.

The 2018 National Survey on Drug Use and Health stated that as many as 139.8 million people over the age of 12 drank alcohol each month which is roughly half of the U.S. population. The higher the alcohol consumption, the higher the cancer risk becomes. The risk for other health issues, such as addiction, increases as well. In 2018, just under 15 million people suffered from alcohol use disorder (addiction) causing them to be exposed to the highest risk of cancer from regular, heavy drinking.
