

CDC Reports 30% Increase in Drug Overdose Deaths Last Year, Muse Addiction Treatment Center Responds

Los Angeles, CA? The stress and isolation of COVID-19 lockdowns and the availability of cheap but deadly fentanyl were a deadly combination in 2020. Experts say the two factors contributed to a shocking 30% increase in drug overdose deaths.

According to preliminary statistics released by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), overdose deaths hit an all-time high of 93,000. About 75 percent of the deaths were from opioids, especially fentanyl.

More than 500,000 people? about 25,000 a year? have died of opioid overdoses since 1999, a figure dwarfed by the 93,000 deaths reported for 2020. The year 2020 set several records for all drug overdoses and for overdose deaths from opioids, especially from fentanyl, a synthetic opioid.

Fentanyl is cheap and easy to manufacture and transport and has become a popular substitute for heroin. It?s part of an addiction cycle that begins when someone is prescribed a legal opioid for pain but becomes dependent on it. When they can no longer get their prescription refilled, they often turn to street drugs like heroin or fentanyl.

The availability of fentanyl came at the same time as COVID was creating circumstances that often lead to addiction or make recovery more difficult.

Especially at the beginning of the pandemic, public health officials called for people to use social distancing to minimize contagion. Many addicts were isolated from friends and loved ones who might have offered support. Many who lost their jobs were coping with unprecedented levels of stress and turned to drugs and alcohol in an attempt to self-medicate.

As bad as the drug overdose numbers are, they could have been even worse. More people have received help because some laws were temporarily relaxed to make treatment easier to access. Methadone patients were allowed to take their doses at home instead of at a clinic, and telemedicine visits have been allowed instead of requiring in-person counseling. Federal funds can be used to buy needles and syringes for exchange programs, and to purchase rapid fentanyl test strips, which can be used to check whether drugs contain fentanyl.

Muse Treatment offers comprehensive therapy for substance use disorders involving drugs, including heroin, fentanyl and other opioids. Treatment includes medically supervised detox, residential and outpatient rehab, sober living homes and extensive follow-up and alumni programs to prevent relapse.
