

SUBSTANCE ABUSE

Substance abuse (also known as drug abuse) is a patterned use of a drug in which the user consumes the substance in amounts or with methods which are harmful to themselves or others, and in a form or substance related to disorder. Widely differing definitions of drug abuse are used in public health, medical and criminal justice contexts. In some cases criminal or anti-social behavior occurs when the person is under the influence of a drug, and long-term personality changes (in individuals) may occur as well. In addition to possible physical, social and psychological harm, use of some drugs may also lead to criminal penalties, although these vary widely depending on the local jurisdiction.

The UK Home Office estimated that the social and economic cost of drug abuse in the UK economy in terms of crime, absenteeism and lost wages, is a total of EUR 2.17 billion. Overall, the highest proportion of this total came within the government functions of Health (60%) (e.g. medical services) and Public Order and Safety (20%) (e.g. police services, law courts, prisons).

These figures represent overall consumer costs, which can be divided in three major categories: health care, criminal justice expenditures.

Health-related costs were projected to total \$16 billion in 2002. Productivity losses were estimated at \$128.6 billion. In contrast to the other costs of drug abuse (which involve direct expenditure for goods and services), this value reflects a loss of potential economic work in the labor market due to reduced productivity that was never performed, but could otherwise be expected to have been performed absent the impact of drug abuse.

The non-health care expenditures primarily concern costs associated with the criminal justice system and crime victim costs, but also include a modest level of expenses for administrative costs of the criminal justice system. The total cost of drug abuse at \$142 billion, the largest source of costs of drug abuse is for state and federal corrections at \$14.2 billion, which is primarily for the support of prisons. Another \$2.6 billion was spent for federal supply reduction initiatives, followed by \$6.2 billion for federal supply reduction initiatives.

IMMIGRANTS AND REFUGEES

Immigrant and refugees have often been under great emotional, physical trauma and depression and anxiety due to separation from loved ones and traumatic events, followed by "culture shock" language barriers, racism, discrimination, economic adversity, overcrowded and difficult housing, and lack of and difficulty obtaining work and forms of transportation and services.

MUSICIANS

In order to maintain high-quality performance, some musicians take periodic substance use. Some musicians take drugs to cope with the stress of performing. As a group they have a higher rate of substance abuse. The most common chemical substance used is alcohol because of its neurological effects.



VETERANS

Substance abuse can be another contributing factor that affects physical and mental health of veterans. Substance abuse may also damage personal relationships, leading to financial difficulties. There is evidence to suggest that substance abuse disproportionately affects the homeless veteran population.

For some, outpatient treatment is a completely viable option for conquering their addiction. Patients can opt for day programs, intensive outpatient programs (IOP), and continuing care. Throughout the patient’s recovery journey at an outpatient program, they undergo therapy, counseling, and group sessions at a facility or clinic. The biggest benefit that outpatient drug treatment programs offer is the ability to continue living with one’s loved ones or supportive family while the treatment is ongoing.

Patients who need medically supervised addiction treatment can sign up for inpatient drug rehab, also known as residential treatment. Designed to treat severe cases of addiction, patients are required to stay in a rehab facility for the duration of the program. Compared to outpatient rehab, an inpatient rehab program is more intensive and structured with several one-on-one or group treatments and therapies administered during the day.

The patient’s choice will be dictated by the kind of programs that an inpatient treatment center is offering as they may vary based on the kind of substance abuse that they are focused on.
