In five new cases of malaria, four of which were in Florida and one in Texas, health officials were alarmed because it implied that mosquitoes in the US are now carrying the unicellular protozoan parasite responsible for malaria. According to the CDC, the last time they had something like that in Palm Beach County, FL, was in 2003.

Malaria is transmitted to people by a female mosquito that is carrying the parasite. A mosquito that is not yet

carrying the parasite can get it by biting an infected person. The parasite multiplies inside that mosquito and when it bites another person, it transmits the parasite to that person. The Anopheles mosquito transmits malaria through its saliva, which is injected into the blood of its victim. Malaria can also be transmitted from person to person through blood transfusion, organ transplants, or sharing needles or syringes because the malaria parasite can reside in the red blood cells of an infected person.

The symptoms of malaria are fever, joint pains, tiredness, headaches, chills, nausea, sweats, vomiting, and more. However, most infected people don't have any symptoms, even while they are already carrying the parasite. The severity of the symptoms will depend on the person's age, general health, and the type of malaria parasite. In some rare cases, the disease can cause damage to the brain or spinal cord, resulting in seizures or loss of consciousness.

While malaria does have a cure and there is a malaria vaccine, preventing the spread of malaria is the best approach. Simple actions, such as getting rid of water pools where mosquitoes can breed, can prevent the spread of the disease.
