Keep Clear of Closing Doors: Ensure clothing items like ties and scarves are safely inside before the doors close.

No Jumping: This can cause the elevator to become uneven with the floor and potentially get stuck.

Emergency Protocol: If stuck, ring the alarm and wait for help. Never attempt to escape on one's own.

Escalator Etiquette
