According to data from Sidecar Health, the typical cost of cataract surgery in Raleigh ranges from \$2,529 to \$3,697 per eye. This wide range reflects several key variables, including the type of intraocular lens (IOL) used, whether the procedure is laser-assisted or basic, and the experience level of the surgeon. Patients often begin their search with one simple question: "How much does cataract surgery cost in Raleigh?" The answer depends on a series of choices made during the treatment planning process. At the

most basic level, cataract surgery involves removing the eye's natural lens, which has become cloudy due to age or other factors, and replacing it with an artificial IOL. Basic cataract surgery, typically covered by Medicare and most private insurance plans, includes the implantation of a monofocal lens that provides clear vision at a single distance—usually for distance vision, but does not correct astigmatism. This means patients will likely still need glasses for astigmatism correction at all ranges and for reading or other close-up tasks.

However, many patients today are opting for advanced cataract surgery, which offers greater visual freedom through the use of advanced technology IOLs, such as multifocal or toric lenses. These lenses are designed to correct additional vision problems like astigmatism or presbyopia, reducing or even eliminating the need for glasses. Advanced surgery may also involve laser-assisted techniques, which enhance precision during the procedure and can lower astigmatism. While these options add to the overall price—sometimes requiring out-of-pocket payments—they also significantly improve postoperative vision and patient satisfaction.

Dr. Porter stresses that understanding the full price of cataract surgery means more than looking at the number on the bill. Some clinics advertise low prices that may not include essential services such as follow-up visits, diagnostic imaging, or post-operative medications. At Porter Ophthalmology, the team offers transparent, all-inclusive pricing so patients know exactly what they are paying for. The location of the procedure also impacts price. Cataract surgery performed in a hospital setting tends to be more expensive than when conducted in an ambulatory surgical center. Insurance plays a major role in the cost equation. Basic cataract surgery is usually covered by Medicare and most private insurance providers, including the implantation of a standard monofocal lens. Medicare covers approximately 80% of the procedure after the deductible is met, leaving patients responsible for the remaining 20% as well as any additional costs for advanced lenses or laser-assisted options. Vision insurance, by contrast, generally does not cover cataract surgery, since it is classified as a medical necessity rather than a vision correction procedure. This distinction can be confusing for patients, which is why Porter Ophthalmology takes the time to walk each patient through their specific coverage and explain available financing options.

Porter Ophthalmology also provides flexible payment plans for patients who opt for advanced surgery or require services not covered by insurance. For many patients, financing allows them to access state-of-the-art technology and lens options that improve their quality of life without the burden of an immediate payment. Dr. Porter believes this approach reflects a growing trend in ophthalmology to deliver

high-value care that prioritizes both clinical outcomes and patient experience.

Beyond cost, one of the most significant differentiators between basic and advanced cataract surgery is the long-term visual outcome. Basic cataract surgery addresses the cloudiness of the natural lens but does not correct other vision issues. Advanced procedures, however, provide opportunities to address nearsightedness, farsightedness, astigmatism, and age-related loss of near vision. With the use of multifocal or extended depth-of-focus lenses, many patients are able to enjoy improved sight at both near and far distances without glasses. This is particularly appealing to active adults who want to maintain independence and avoid the limitations of prescription eyewear.

Dr. Porter personally evaluates each patient to determine the best surgical plan and lens option based on their lifestyle, vision goals, and eye health. He explains that some patients are ideal candidates for advanced technology IOLs and laser-assisted techniques, while others may benefit more from a basic approach.
