Independent guidance from public sector authorities has emphasised proportionate, iterative delivery governed by clear accountability, mirroring the site?s emphasis on balance. Over time, more consistent exposure to pragmatic Agile approaches could moderate polarised debates between purity and practicality, with delivery performance and learning outcomes shaping the centre of gravity. The likely consequence is quieter

transformation marked by measurable outcomes rather than headline claims.
