When water has nowhere to go, it often finds its way under shingles or through existing gaps.

Homeowners are also advised to check for signs of interior moisture, particularly in attics or upper-level ceilings. Discoloration, musty odors, or the appearance of mold could be early warnings of a leak that has yet to make itself visible from the outside.

?In many cases, the first visible sign of a roof problem is a ceiling stain, but by then water may have already been present for some time,? Braasch added. ?It?s not always about looking at the roof itself?sometimes, the signs show up inside the home.?

Seasonal changes can also influence the risk level for leaks. In the fall, the combination of falling leaves and cooler temperatures can impact gutter performance and attic ventilation. In winter, snow and ice may place stress on older or damaged roofing systems. Spring and summer, with their frequent storms, may reveal weaknesses in aging shingles or flashing.

Rather than waiting for a leak to occur, roofers generally recommend being aware of recurring patterns. If a roof has experienced small issues in the past?such as missing shingles or minor flashing repairs?it may be worth evaluating those areas more closely during transitional weather periods.

While some basic checks can be done visually from the ground, the company advises against climbing onto roofs without proper training or safety precautions.
