According to the information shared by Toronto Functional Medicine Centre, the Toothache Plant offers nutritional value beyond its traditional uses. The edible leaves contain magnesium, lutein, and vitamins C, A, and K. Research cited in the educational material indicates that raw toothache plants contain 24 percent more protein than conventional vegetables.

The anti-inflammatory properties of spilanthol may help reduce both the perception of pain and physical inflammation, similar to common pain management approaches using acetaminophen or ibuprofen. The plant's components are thought to potentially help with stomatitis, a condition involving inflammation of the mucous linings of the lip and mouth.

The educational resource also outlines important considerations for those interested in botanical medicine. The Toothache Plant may not be suitable for pregnant or breastfeeding individuals, those with allergies to daisies or other plants from the Asteraceae family, people taking diuretics, or males diagnosed with prostate cancer.
