



## **West Virginia Overdose Trend Rising as New Rehab Blog Warns About Mixing Oxycodone and Alcohol**

In one of the article's most direct lines, it states, "There's no warning, no final plea for help. Just silence." Even when an overdose is not fatal, the blog notes that lack of oxygen can cause long-term harm, including lasting cognitive issues, heart weakness, and liver strain, especially as the body tries to process both substances at once.

The blog also describes how mixing alcohol and oxycodone can accelerate dependence. It explains that because alcohol can intensify oxycodone's euphoric effects, "the brain starts to crave that high," which can lead to increased use, higher tolerance, and deeper dependency.
