



## **BoxKing Highlights Modular Board Game Storage Solutions for Growing Game Collections**

As modern tabletop collections continue to grow, the standard cube shelving and other general storage furniture found in most homes is often not enough to hold the ever-increasing amount of large board games. The oversized campaign games, large numbers of expansions for games, and the lack of a suitable gaming space are all becoming problems for gamers everywhere. BoxKing is drawing attention to how modern tabletop players approach BoxKing board game storage as collections grow beyond a few boxes and begin taking over living rooms, game rooms, and shared spaces. For many hobbyists, the challenge is no longer finding new titles to play, but finding a cleaner, safer, and more flexible way to store the games they already own. Ideally the players want to be able to access their favorite games without having to move stacks of others that have been stacked haphazardly and are now scratched and difficult to remove from the stack.

BoxKing positions its storage collection as an integrated part of the tabletop experience rather than simply another piece of furniture. Through its board game storage systems, the company focuses on helping players organize collections in a way that supports both everyday use and long-term display. Instead of treating

shelves as an afterthought, BoxKing frames storage as part of the full tabletop experience, giving collectors a way to protect boxes, reduce friction when pulling games off the shelf, and make better use of limited space.

One example is BoxKing BoxThrone, a shelving system designed around adjustable and expandable organization for boxed games. On the BoxKing site, the collection is presented as more than a single product. It includes Complete BoxThrone setups for all-in-one storage, BoxThrone Expansions for collectors who need more capacity over time, extra shelf packs for additional flexibility, and add-ons and accessories that help users tailor a setup to the shape and scale of their collection.

BoxKing's tower collection of BoxKing game storage towers also follows the modular principle. The company offers a range of tower units that can be placed in a room in order to stow away a hobbyist's growing library of games. Tower units can also help accommodate mixed box sizes and evolving room layouts as collections grow. The collection emphasizes adjustable shelves and expandable designs that can adapt to changing collections over time.

The current collection gives that message some useful specificity. BoxKing features the GamePillar Adjustable Board Game Tower in both tall and short formats to fit rooms of different sizes. In addition to that, BoxKing features the GameKeep Shelfcase in short and tall formats. As GameKeep already has a modular design, the tall and short varieties give board game collectors another modular option for organizing larger game boxes. Finally, the collection includes a board game storage rack with movable, adjustable shelves on wheels. This shows how BoxKing thinks about storage in terms of mobility as well as access.

Taken together, those product families help BoxKing speak to more than one kind of tabletop buyer. Some customers want a main display wall for a dedicated game room. Others need a more compact tower or shelfcase that fits beside a dining table, media console, or office wall. By building around adjustable and expandable formats, BoxKing gives collectors room to start with a smaller setup and extend it as their library changes, rather than replacing furniture every time the stack gets harder to manage.

"Many players spend significant time choosing tables, inserts, and accessories, but storage is often treated as an afterthought," said by BoxKing. "We believe storage should be considered part of the overall tabletop experience because it affects accessibility, organization, and long-term collection care."

That positioning matters because board game collections often grow in uneven ways. Big campaign boxes, long expansion boxes, and standard square titles rarely store well in one-size-fits-all shelving. BoxKing's emphasis on modularity, tidy presentation, and easier access addresses that problem directly. The result is a storage category that feels designed for hobby use, not borrowed from general home furniture and asked to

do a job it was never built to handle.

As interest in dedicated tabletop spaces continues to rise, BoxKing is making the case that storage deserves the same level of attention players already give to tables, chairs, and accessories. With BoxThrone, GamePillar, GameKeep, and related shelving options, the brand is presenting storage as a functional part of the hobby: one that helps collections stay protected, visible, and ready for game night. BoxKing believes that modular systems capable of adapting to changing collections will play a growing role in helping players keep their libraries organized, accessible, and ready for play.
