The guide also addresses prefab homes as a broader category. Prefab generally refers to housing that is built off-site in some form before it reaches the property. Modular homes are one type of prefab home, but prefab should not be used as a blanket replacement for modular, manufactured, or mobile without understanding how the home is built and what code applies.

For buyers, the practical issue is not terminology alone. The home type can influence site planning, foundation requirements, delivery and setup, utility connections, permits, customization, lender conversations, and move-in expectations. A buyer comparing a modular home and a manufactured home may be looking at two options that differ in construction standards, financing path, service scope, and long-term ownership considerations.
