



AEI Decon Meth & Mold Remediation Outlines Proper Response Steps for Utah Property Owners Facing Mold and Moisture Damage

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AEI Decon Meth & Mold Remediation has issued guidance for Utah property owners who discover visible mold, persistent musty odors, or signs of moisture damage, emphasizing that surface treatment alone rarely resolves the underlying problem. The company reports that many homeowners, landlords, and property managers attempt to address mold by cleaning only what is visible, which often allows the contamination to return once the moisture source remains active.

According to AEI Decon in Utah, the discovery of mold should prompt a structured response that begins with identifying the source of moisture. Water intrusion from plumbing leaks, roof damage, poor ventilation, or flooding can create conditions that allow mold to grow within walls, ductwork, and other hidden areas. Without locating and correcting that moisture source, remediation efforts applied to visible surfaces tend to provide only temporary results.

The company outlines a process that includes testing to determine the extent of contamination, containment to prevent spores from spreading during removal, thorough removal of affected materials, and verification once the work is complete. This sequence is intended to confirm that a property has been returned to a healthy condition rather than simply appearing clean on the surface. Duct systems and HVAC components frequently require attention, as mold colonies in these areas can distribute spores throughout a structure.

Eric Wright, owner of AEI Decon, said the timing of a property owner's response often determines the scope of the work required. "When mold is caught early and the moisture source is addressed at the same time, the situation is usually far more manageable," Wright said. "The mistake we see most often is that someone wipes down a visible patch, the surface looks fine for a while, and then it comes back because the water problem was never resolved."

Wright noted that the guidance applies to a range of situations beyond single-family homes. "Landlords, property managers, and real estate professionals are dealing with these questions constantly, especially during transactions or tenant turnovers," he said. "Understanding what proper containment and verification actually involves helps them make informed decisions rather than relying on a quick cosmetic fix."

AEI Decon reports that musty odors without visible growth can indicate hidden contamination, and that moisture levels in materials should be assessed as part of any evaluation. The company recommends that property owners document conditions, avoid disturbing suspected growth in ways that could spread spores, and seek testing when the extent of a problem is unclear.
