



SERVPRO of Northwest Genesee County Shares Guidance on Improving Indoor Air Quality Through Professional Air Duct and HVAC Cleaning

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Indoor air quality remains a consistent focus for property owners and facility managers as residential and commercial buildings rely on heating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems to circulate conditioned air throughout occupied spaces. SERVPRO of Northwest Genesee County, which maintains specialty cleaning capabilities that encompass air duct cleaning and HVAC cleaning, has outlined key considerations for understanding how these systems function over time and why professional attention to ductwork and related components forms part of routine property care.

HVAC systems draw air from indoor environments, pass it through filters, and redistribute it via a network of ducts. Over months and years of operation, dust, debris, pollen, and other particulate matter can settle on internal surfaces of the ductwork and within the equipment itself. Everyday activities, foot traffic, construction or renovation work, and seasonal changes contribute to this gradual accumulation. When particles remain inside the system, they may become resuspended and recirculated each time the unit operates. This process can influence the volume of airborne material present in living and working areas and may affect the overall efficiency of airflow.

Professional air duct cleaning addresses the interior surfaces of the duct network and associated components that standard filter replacement does not reach. While changing filters at recommended intervals is an important first step in system upkeep, filters capture only a portion of the material that enters the equipment. Contaminants that bypass or accumulate beyond the filter media can continue to collect on coils, blower components, and duct walls. A thorough cleaning process removes these deposits using specialized equipment designed for the task, helping restore more consistent airflow and reducing the quantity of particles available for recirculation.

In both homes and commercial buildings, indoor environments are shaped by continuous air movement. Residential spaces often experience higher concentrations of everyday dust generated by occupancy, pets, and household activities. Commercial properties, including offices, retail locations, educational facilities, and multi-unit structures, face additional contributions from higher foot traffic, equipment operation, and varying occupancy patterns. In each setting, maintaining clearer pathways for air movement supports the system's intended performance. SERVPRO of Northwest Genesee County notes that specialty cleaning services, including air duct cleaning and HVAC cleaning, are frequently integrated into broader maintenance schedules precisely because they address areas that routine surface cleaning and filter changes leave untouched.

Certain situations increase the likelihood of elevated particulate loads within HVAC systems. Post-construction or remodeling projects commonly introduce drywall dust, sawdust, and fine debris that migrate into open ductwork. After a fire or smoke event, soot and residue can travel through the system and settle on internal surfaces, creating persistent odor and particulate concerns even after visible cleanup is complete. In these instances, professional attention to the duct network and HVAC components helps remove residual material that would otherwise continue circulating. Commercial cleaning operations in larger facilities may also coordinate duct and system cleaning as part of scheduled facility maintenance to manage cumulative buildup across extensive networks.

Joshua A. Ingersoll, Owner of SERVPRO of Northwest Genesee County, observed that consistent attention to HVAC systems contributes to long-term property care. "Dust and debris collect inside ductwork and equipment over time regardless of how carefully filters are maintained," Ingersoll said. "Professional air duct cleaning and HVAC cleaning remove material that settles beyond the reach of ordinary maintenance, supporting more reliable airflow and contributing to overall indoor environmental quality in both residential and commercial settings."

Dean M. Dingman, Owner, emphasized the value of established procedures. "Following recognized cleaning methods ensures that the work addresses the full system rather than isolated sections," Dingman said. "Property managers and homeowners benefit when the process is approached as part of preventive care, particularly after events that introduce higher volumes of particulate matter or when systems have operated

for extended periods without internal cleaning.?

Eric D. Chesser, Owner, added that the same principles apply across property types. ?Whether the space is a single-family home or a multi-tenant commercial building, the mechanics of air movement remain consistent,? Chesser said. ?Specialty cleaning that includes air duct cleaning and HVAC cleaning allows owners and managers to manage the accumulation that occurs inside the system itself, helping maintain the conditions the equipment was designed to deliver.?

Industry practice recognizes that indoor air quality is influenced by multiple factors, including outdoor air infiltration, occupant activities, building materials, and the condition of mechanical systems. Professional cleaning of ducts and HVAC components does not eliminate every source of airborne particles, nor does it alter outdoor conditions or human activity inside a building. It does, however, reduce one controllable source of recirculated material and can support more efficient system operation by clearing pathways that restrict airflow. Property owners who incorporate this work into regular maintenance cycles often do so alongside filter changes, coil cleaning when indicated, and periodic system inspections.

The decision to schedule professional service typically follows an assessment of system age, recent construction or damage events, visible dust at supply registers, or noticeable changes in airflow. Technicians trained in the process use containment methods, specialized vacuums, and mechanical agitation tools to dislodge and remove deposits while limiting the release of material back into occupied spaces. Documentation of the work and verification of system condition after cleaning provide property owners with a clear record of the maintenance performed.

In commercial environments the scale of duct networks and the continuous operation of systems can accelerate accumulation compared with many residential installations. Coordinating commercial cleaning activities that include air duct and HVAC components allows facility managers to address both occupied areas and the hidden pathways that supply them. The same logic applies after water, fire, or storm events when restoration work may leave residual dust or require system protection during the recovery process.
